Struggle ~ Endurance ~ Character ~ Hope Romans 5:4 (NET)

For I know what I have planned for you,' says the Lord. 'I have plans to prosper you, not to harm you. I have plans to give you a future filled with hope. Jeremiah 29:11 (NET)

What is it that we faith-filled pilgrims need in the opening days of a new year...? In answer, I am drawn to the "hope-filled" texts of scripture. These references to the ancient affirmations from Jeremiah and the learning outcomes from the Apostle Paul point us toward a posture of active HOPE. I choose to be HOPE-FILLED in these days where the public narrative is too often portrayed as *dire*, *dreadful*, and *despairing*.

Life sometimes gives us lessons if we are paying attention. For example, last week we looked out our window and saw a disabled and abandoned vehicle blocking our driveway. The following is expression of the inspiration and life lesson that followed in response to this incident with the question: "Where does resistance and resilience meet?"

How we (Jesus Followers) experience resistance is telling on our capacity to respond to resistance with faith and resilience. Resilience seems to be baked into what it means to be a practicing believer. So many biblical illustrations and narratives come to mind. I am choosing to focus in this writing on what inspires me to meet resistance with forward-leaning hope.

I recently read that, "beginning in 1755, John Wesley (founder of Methodism) encouraged gathering for worship on New Year's Eve for a Covenant Renewal Service... central features of this service are remembering the past year—something of a communal examen—as well as recommitting to following Christ..." In these early days of a new year, perhaps Wesley's stratum might move me and my fellow believers to grounding acts that remembers the past... involves self-reflection... and reaffirms faithful discipleship disciplines. After all, I believe with confident faith that God has our back, our present, and our future. As the old hymnal lyrics go, Wholly lean on Jesus' Name." Amen!
