Perhaps we who are in Christian communities and churches should take a re-look at our roles and relationships through the textual lens of 1 Corinthians 13. I am of the conviction that if my behavior toward another person causes them hurt or harm, then I am in violation of the spirit and letter of the biblical teaching of "love one another" (and "love your neighbor").

It seems like rationalizing if I lean on the admonition to always tell the truth and never affirm deviance or walk with sinners, etc. (pick your virtue text)— like the addiction recovery mantra that our community informs our behavior. All of which holds some truth and valuable teaching— but could lead to self-justification for abusive/excluding/harming behaviors.

Is it unrealistic to expect that believers who share the same faith community should go out of their way to care for each other? It is too superficial to just say that we are friendly and love everyone—or to maybe just presume that these admonitions in 1 Corinthians to make other-directed love our normal are just aspirational...?

Sometimes questions lead us to insights that answers fail to do. What if we should allow the attributes of this "agape (other-directed)" love passage in 1 Corinthians 13 to be an inventory for measuring our relationships with others, especially those we share church with.

Like: on a scale of 0 to 5 how strong is the level of our "love one another" factors?

- Love is patient (0\_\_\_5) love is kind does not envy does not boast is not proud
- does not dishonor others
   is not self-seeking
   is not easily angered
   keeps no record of wrongs
   does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth
   always protects
   always trusts
   always hopes
   always perseveres

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
