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Missouri Amendment 2, Medicaid Expansion Initiative (2020)

(Recirected from Missouri Medicaid Expansion Initiative (2020))

Missouri Amendment 2, the Medicaid Expansion Initiative is on the ballot in Missouri as an initiated constitutional amendment on August 4, 2020.^[1]


- A "yes" vote is a vote in favor of
- expanding Medicaid eligibility in Missouri to adults that are 19 years old or older and younger than 65
 whose income is 133% of the federal poverty level or below, which would effectively expand Medicaid to
 those with incomes at or below 138% of the federal poverty level under the Affordable Care Act;
- prohibiting any additional restrictions or requirements for the expanded population to qualify for Medicaid coverage than for other populations that qualify for Medicaid coverage; and
- · requiring the state to seek maximum federal funding of Medicaid expansion.


A "no" vote is a vote <u>against</u> this constitutional amendment to expand Medicaid eligibility in Missouri under the Affordable Care Act.


On May 22, 2020, the Missouri Secretary of State issued a statement certifying the initiative for the ballot. The secretary of state used a random sample method, which projected enough valid signatures in congressional districts 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, and 7 to qualify the measure for the ballot. The initiative will appear on the August 4 primary election ballot unless the governor calls for it to be placed on the ballot for the August election before May 26. Healthcare for Missouri submitted 341,440 signatures to the Missouri Secretary of State on May 1, 2020.^{[2][3]}




Where Do Uninsured Adults Who Would Be Eligible for Medicaid if Missouri Expanded Live?

Missouri Lobbying, Campaign Finance, and Redistricting Amendment (2020)

The Missouri Lobbying, Campaign Finance, and Redistricting Amendment is on the ballot in Missouri as a legislatively referred constitutional amendment on November 3, 2020.^[1]

- A "yes" vote supports amending the Missouri Constitution to enact the following changes:
 - eliminate the nonpartisan state demographer and use a bipartisan commission appointed by the governor again;
 - · alter the criteria used to draw district maps,
 - · change the threshold of lobbyists gifts from \$5 to \$0, and
 - lower the campaign contribution limit for state senate campaigns from \$2,500 to \$2,400.

A "no" vote opposes amending the Missouri Constitution, thereby maintaining:

- · the state's use of a nonpartisan state demographer for legislative redistricting,
- · the existing criteria used to draw legislative districts, and
- the existing campaign finance and lobbying limits.

The measure would amend Article III of the Missouri Constitution to change certain provisions of Missouri Amendment 1 passed in 2018 with 62% of the vote.
